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# Support + Services + Shelter = HOPE

This past year has been one of challenge but also one of much success.

The numbers of people utilizing our shelters through the PADS Program has increased, and the number of services provided at the HOPE Center has also increased. However, the good news is that the overall number of people needing to access JOURNEYS programs has decreased.

What does a decrease in the total number served mean? It means that JOURNEYS is doing its job and doing it well!

JOURNEYS began noticing our shelter sites were getting full earlier this season than in years prior. We were able to increase capacity at some sites, but ultimately, we had to institute a lottery system. Even though we were offering more beds in our shelters than ever before, we exceeded capacity in the shelter program. Why? Because new people became homeless. JOURNEYS cannot predict or anticipate who may become homeless, but we work very hard at preventing it as soon as we become aware.

At the same time that the shelter demand increased, demand at the HOPE Center decreased. Why? We are stabilizing people in their homes by working with them on the front-end to avoid homelessness and instability. We look into family relationships that may be able to be mended, we utilize non-traditional funding streams to pay for rent and offset bills, and we divert people from homelessness by coordinating with other agencies and landlords to keep people in their homes.

Additionally, the number and intensity of services at the HOPE Center has increased. We have been so successful with diversion that we have more time to spend with each person who comes into the center. Case managers have been able to provide longer sessions and more resources, while the day center is able to provide more meals, and offer more laundry and offer more showers, haircuts, job coaching, and placement, etc.

Is homelessness going away? It does not appear so. However, with strong and growing relationships with our faith-based partners, our community members, local corporations, and family foundations we have been able to offer unique, specialized, efficient, and state of the art interventions to divert, intervene, serve, shelter and house those in need.

JOURNEYS is leading the way out of homelessness and poverty. Much work is still needed, and we need you to make it happen. It is because of each JOURNEYS family member that we are moving the needle forward in ending homelessness in our region. If you haven't joined the team – we could sure use your support!

Stay tuned – JOURNEYS is not done paving the road home for those in need. Who knows what next year may bring, but JOURNEYS will be ready because together, we are stabilizing lives!




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# Service Area

JOURNEYS serves the north and northwest suburbs of Cook County. The service area borders Lake, McHenry, & DuPage counties.







The face of homelessness is more diverse than ever and is reflected in the clients who come to JOURNEYS. More families use our services and shelter, as well as more people with income. While the number of clients we served dipped this year, the services requested and diversity of needs and backgrounds increased significantly.

# **HOPE** Center

Each year, the HOPE Center helps hundreds of people get or keep permanent and stable housing through services and our Pathways Housing Readiness Program. Staff provide case management and counseling to help people navigate challenges big and small, while volunteers provide support and assistance with everyday needs like laundry, showers, clothing, and meals.

This year, though the number of clients we served overall is down, requested services and shelter use has greatly increased. As other agencies lose funding or close their doors, demand for assistance is up and more clients walk into our HOPE Center needing a wider variety of services. This year we saw more clients needing help with obtaining IDs and other documents, rides to the DMV, help applying for licenses to work specialized jobs, and more. The list of services we provide is over 60 and the hours logged this year by our case managers shows just how dedicated JOURNEYS is to getting people to a stable and self-sufficient life.

Additionally, in January we launched our **Amazon Wish List**, allowing for more specific needs of our cilents to be met. Our community has donated in droves from this list, sending us much needed items like child carseats, walking canes, clothing of less-common sizes, and even gift cards. Without this community support, we would not be able to rise to the challenge of meeting the unique needs of our clients.

# PADS Shelter Program

The PADS Shelter Program is comprised of **21 overnight sites** spread throughout our service area. The shelter sites are hosted at faith-based locations and are staffed by volunteers who dedicate their time in a variety of roles. The PADS Program provides an important sense of stability in the midst of what is a challenging situation for our guests.

Once again, while our total population of clients dipped, demand for shelter was higher than ever. **For the first time in our agency's history, a lottery system was implemented.** What started as a once-weekly occurence actually ended up turning into **three days per week.** Staff and volunteers were stretched, clients felt the strain, but the season ended a success, with sights set on growing in the coming year.

In May of 2018, JOURNEYS Summer Shelter Program continued to expand, as **2 more sites opened their doors**, bringing us to a **total of 5 nights** of Summer Shelter and two steps closer to our goal of having shelter available 7 days a week, 365 days a year. The need is there, and together with our faith partners and community support, we will continue to strive to meet that demand and provide shelter for as many of our neighbors as possible.




